About AFCC 2024

The 15th Asian Festival of Children's Content (AFCC) will take place from 23–26 May 2024, at the National Library Building, Singapore, celebrating the theme of “Curiosity” and with Philippines as the Country of Focus.

Theme – Curiosity

The Asian Festival of Children's Content takes on the theme of “Curiosity” in its 15th edition.

Curiosity drives exploration, innovation and the imagination. It can open up possibilities, expand one's worldview and spur children to embark on a path of discovery.

How can we nurture a child's curiosity through books and encourage them to explore the world around them? How can modern technologies be harnessed to cultivate children's curiosity and engagement in reading? In what ways can cultural diversity be shown in stories and works from Southeast Asia and Asia, that can shape children's curiosity and develop a sense of the self?

With over 100 programmes, featuring more than 80 writers and speakers from Singapore and around the world, AFCC 2024 will explore the different dimensions of “Curiosity” through children's books, stories and performances.

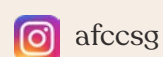
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AFCC

At the COF booth in the AFCC Book Fair, attendees will be introduced to outstanding Filipino children's books, public performances and reading initiatives across Philippine regions, languages and international translations.

PRESENTATION **Weaving the SEA: Championing Southeast Asian Cultures**

From etching history on cave walls, writing poetry on bamboo, to chanting epics of heroism and love, Southeast Asian stories have always been rich and diverse. Faced with the socio-economic challenges of the now, National Book Development Board (NBDB) Chair Dante “Klink” Ang II weighs in on the crucial role of books and storytelling in diplomacy.

Celebrating 55 years of bilateral ties between the Philippines and Singapore, this keynote underscores the inevitability of this collaboration and the role of the Philippines as Country of Focus, given the shared Southeast Asian histories of tribulations and triumphs.

Her campaign re-centred the nation's perspective to prioritise mother tongue languages and to use books as tools for deep engagement—from creating reading centres in indigenous areas to mobilising policy makers, to prioritising Filipino stories.

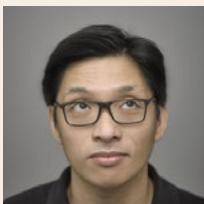

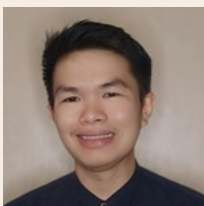

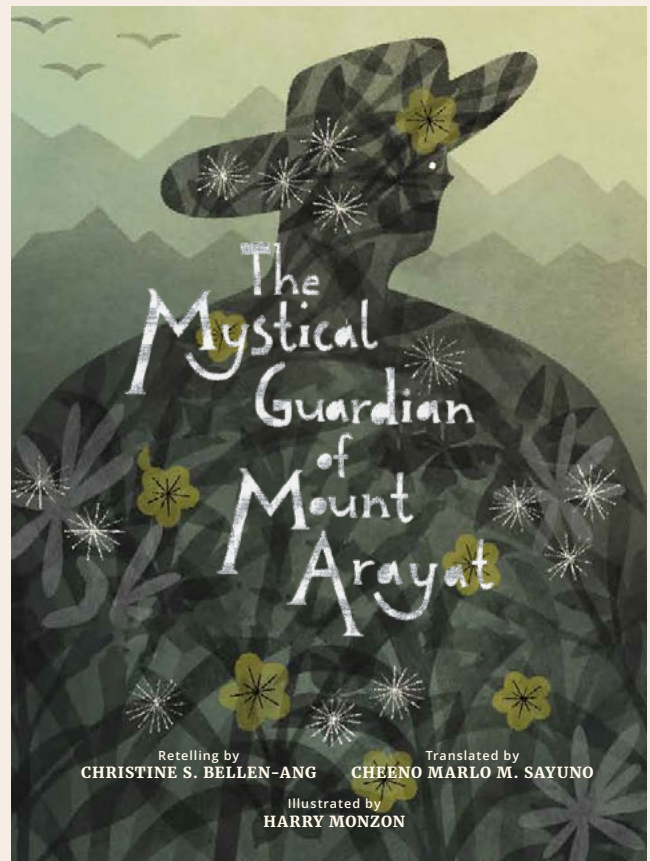
Country of Focus: Co-Translation Project

As part of the festival's aim to bridge borders and build stronger cultural connections, AFCC is delighted to embark on the third edition of the AFCC Co-Translation Book Project.

The third edition will see the translation and publication of five (5) selected children's books from both the Philippines and Singapore. This Co-Translation Book project is carried out in partnership with the National Book Development Board (NBDB).

Five children's book titles from each country will be selected and translated from Filipino into English, and vice versa. The selected books will be announced at AFCC, and the books will be published later in the year.

The translated books will be made available to children in both countries through their respective local reading initiatives. Through this Co-Translation Project, children and parents from both countries will be able to discover and appreciate stories and characters from a different part of the world, and gain a deeper understanding of our respective cultures.



Hedwig Anuar Children's Book Award 2024

The Hedwig Anuar Children's Book Award (HABA) is presented biennially to an outstanding Singapore children's picture book and middle grade book.

Eight books have been shortlisted for HABA 2024.

The objectives of the award are:

- » To recognise outstanding published works by Singapore writers and illustrators
- » To encourage the publication of quality children's books in Singapore

Becoming Margaret Leng Tan: The Toy Piano Virtuoso Who Couldn't Stop Counting

It is not easy being Margaret Leng Tan. Her obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD) is her constant companion and counting controls her life. Imagine her joy and relief when she began her first piano lessons and discovered where counting truly belonged... in music!

This is the story of how Margaret made friends with her OCD. It is also about how she became the world's first toy piano virtuoso. This book is the first title in the *Becoming Extraordinary* series featuring people who overcame challenges to excel in their fields. This inspiring true story based on the life of Margaret Leng Tan, who has triumphed against her lifelong struggles with obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD). She is a living role model for children dealing with challenges of their own. The books in this series provide a fitting platform to engage children to discuss hard topics such as mental disorders, about having different abilities and accepting differences.

A journalist by profession, Low Lai Chow entered the world of children's literature in 2020 as the creator of National Gallery Singapore's Art for Tinies board book series with *Eat With Your Eyes* (2020) and *I Want to Play House* (2022). Subsequently authoring *Catch Mee If You Can: Find the Noodles, Eat the Noodles!* (2022), Lai Chow made her illustrating debut with *Penguins Eat Pancakes* (2022), followed by *My Mum and Dad are Separated* (2023) and three Chinese-English titles in *The Game of Guessing* series 《最佳猜档》系列 (2023). *Margaret Leng Tan: The Toy Piano Virtuoso Who Couldn't Stop Counting* (2023) is her ninth book – and her most representative work to date.



Dan Kuah (Illustrator)

Dan Kuah is a comic artist based in Singapore. He began pursuing his dream of becoming a comic book artist when he was just 12 years old, selling copies of his first works to his classmates in school. By 21, he had published his first Chinese comic book. Today, Dan is a published author of seven books covering varying topics.



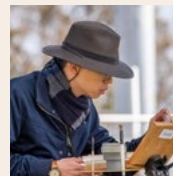
Bee Hoon Boy

Was it really a tiger that Grandma saw on Pulau Ubin while gathering clams one warm, sunny morning? And what will animal expert Dr Sunny Banuna and his team find when they embark on their big tiger hunt across the island?

From the award-winning duo of Alan John and Quek Hong Shin comes another charming and lively children's story, *Grandma's Tiger*. The tale was inspired by a slice of Singapore history – a few frenzied days in 1997 when a tiger was “spotted” on Ubin. Children will turn the pages eagerly as they, too, go on a tiger search and try to spot the tiger along the way. The book is also filled with many beautifully-rendered illustrations of other creatures found in the region, such as the tiger beetle, the giant Asian mantis and the knobbly sea star. *Grandma's Tiger* won the Best Picture Book award in the 2023 Singapore Book Awards, organised by the Singapore Book Publishers Association. It was also included in the White Ravens 2023 recommendation list by the International Youth Library.



Alan John (Author)

Alan John is a journalist, writer and editorial trainer. He is the director of the Asia Journalism Fellowship and a consulting editor of the *South China Morning Post*. In 2023, Alan joined the SPH Media Academy as a trainer for its journalism programmes.



Quek Hong Shin (Illustrator)

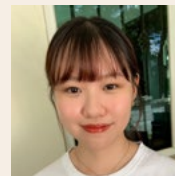

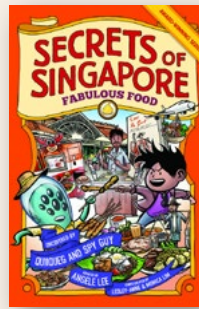
Escape from Bussorah Street

In 1992, Zai submitted her 10,000 word realistic fiction to the Singapore Literature Prize's first ever writing competition. Since then, Zai has been writing poetry, drama scripts and short stories for competitions and for pleasure.

The Judges

Judges' Comments:

It was a joy reading the books submitted for the Hedwig Anuar Book Award. The overall quality of the submissions reflect how much Singaporean children's literature has evolved in quality and sophistication over the years. There is a wide range of themes explored in the submitted stories: from clever informational texts to historical events to delightful flights of imagination. The judges deliberated on not just literary and visual merit, but also readership appeal and originality – evoking an unmistakable sense of place and community, that is not only distinctly Singaporean in nature, but also reflective of the global world that readers (young and old alike) are a part of.



Dr Myra Garces Bacsal (United Arab Emirates)

Dr Myra Garces-Bacsal is a Teacher Educator and a registered clinical psychologist based in Al Ain, United Arab Emirates. Prior to moving to the Middle East, she lived for eleven years in Singapore serving as a teacher educator. She has edited five books on rediscovering children's literature in Asia (with a focus on the Philippines, Malaysia, India, China, Japan) as part of the proceedings for the Asian Festival of Children's Content where she served as the Chair of the Programme Committee for the Asian Children's Writers and Illustrators Conference from 2011 until 2019. While she is an academic by day, she is a closet poet and a book hunter at heart.



Dr Eugene Evasco (Philippines)

Eugene Y. Evasco is a writer, editor, translator, and collector of children's books. He is currently a Full Professor at the UP College of Arts and Letters. Some of his new books at Lampara are *Ang Nag-iisa at Natatanging si Onyok*, *Ang Singing-Pari sa Pisara*, *Ang Beybi naming Mamaw*, and the Filipino translation of *Charlotte's Web* by E.B. White. In 2014, he won the UP Gawad sa Natatanging Publikasyon sa Filipino (Malikhaing Pagsulat category). He became a part of the Hall of Fame of the Carlos Palanca Memorial Awards for Literature in 2009 and is currently a Fellow of the UP Institute of Creative Writing. He was accepted as a Research Fellow to the International Youth Library in Munich, Germany.

A graduate of the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD), she loves woolgathering, writing stories and maintains her sheep obsession at healthy levels. - » To recognise and award a prize to an excellent picture book with Asian content



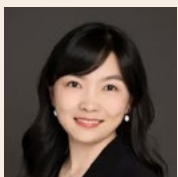

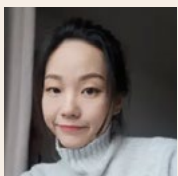

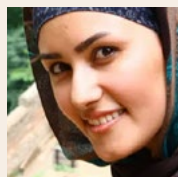
Nguyen Thuy Tien (Vietnam)

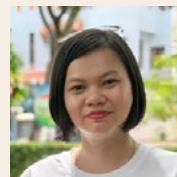

Uyen Dao lives in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam. She works as a freelance writer. Through her works, she wants to celebrate the miracle of childhood.



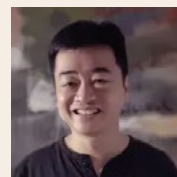
Hoai Phong (Vietnam)

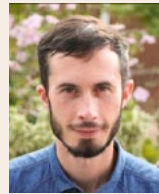
graphic design and scriptwriting.

Germany – Internationale Jugendbibliothek / International Youth Library

The Internationale Jugendbibliothek (International Youth Library), based in Munich, is the world's largest library for international children's books. Its unique collection consists of more than 660,000 books in 250 languages spanning six centuries. The book holdings and historical collections are available to researchers from around the world for scholarly use. The library's central task is to promote global children's and youth literature of high aesthetic and literary quality and of significance for cultural literacy.



Chang Young-Eun

Young-Eun holds a PhD in German Literature from the Otto-Friedrich-Bamberg University in Germany and is a Professor in the Department of German Language & Culture at Sookmyung Women's University, Seoul. She is an Advisory Board Member for Korean Research Center for International Children's & Adolescent Literature in Seoul. She is specialised in comparative study about German and Korean children's Books. Her interests include reading and teaching children's literature.



Reina Nakano

An anglicist and translator, Reina works at the International Library of Children's Literature, Tokyo as the International Youth Library's Japanese language specialist.



Roya Maktabi

Leila (Roya) Maktabi Fard has been working as faculty member and researcher in Children's literature studies in Iran. She has a PH.D in Library and Information Science with a focus on Children's Libraries and still works as a freelance researcher, translator and editor of children's books. She is now a children's librarian in Munich City Library and Persian language specialist at the International Youth Library in Munich, Germany.



India – Pratham Books/ Storyweaver

Pratham Books was set up as a not-for-profit children's book publisher in 2004 with the mission to see 'a book in every child's hand'. The key objective was to publish good quality, affordable storybooks in multiple Indian languages to support reading acquisition among children. Technology and open licenses allow Pratham Books to reach far more children than ever before. By adopting the Creative Commons licensing model, it enables their stories to find new life in Indian and global languages, as well as new forms like audio books, Braille books, videos, and digital applications.



Canato Jimo

Canato Jimo is a picture book maker from India. He is particularly fond of wordless picture books and also likes to explore the dark and bizarre in picture books. He did his masters in graphic design at the National Institute of Design, Ahmedabad, India. He currently works as an art director at Pratham Books. He finds it fascinating collaborating with artists and watching picture books come alive. His book *Snip* has made it to the TATA Parag Honour List 2020 and has also been shortlisted for the Publishing Next children's Book of the Year 2020 award (0-8 years).



Indonesia – Indonesian Section of International Board on Books for Young People (INABBY)

The Indonesian Section of IBBY (INABBY, 1990-) was founded by Dr Murti Bunanta; she and her colleagues have been working tirelessly to bring children and books together and to promote quality children's books. INABBY frequently conducts national and international seminars and workshops for authors, illustrators, editors, storytellers, researchers, educators, librarians and also organises many events for children to instil their love for reading. INABBY hosted the first Asia and Oceania regional IBBY Congress in Bali, on May 2013. This inaugural congress features the uniqueness of Asia and Oceania regional stories which can play in the world of children's literature market.



Murti Bunanta

Murti Bunanta is a children's literature specialist, writer, and founder of two nonprofit organisations, The Society for The Advancement of Children's Literature and the Indonesian Board on Books for Young People. She has authored 50 books, given lectures in 22 countries, and written

250 essays. Her works have been translated into several languages, earning her seven international recognitions for her books and six for promoting children's literature.



Amanda Ariawan

Amanda Ariawan is a young curator and art writer. She obtained her MA in Contemporary Art Exhibition Production from Université de Lille 3, France. In line with her research, Amanda has worked on several curatorial projects and publications. Through her exhibitions, she aims

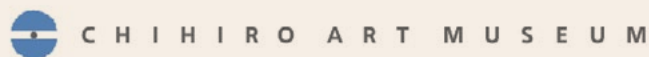
to create inclusivity by connecting art to various publics including children. In 2023 she was selected as an international jury member for the Biennale of Illustration Bratislava (BIB).



Maria Christania

Maria Christania is an illustrator based in the UK. She received an MA in Children's Book Illustration at Cambridge School of Art, Anglia Ruskin University. In her career as an illustrator, Maria has written and illustrated 30+ children's picture books. She was awarded the IBBY Honorary

Mention for Publisher in 2013, an IBBY Honour List in 2014, a nomination for the 2023 Carnegie Medals for Illustration and shortlisted for the Children's Picture Book Award at the Derby Book Festival 2023.



Japan – Chihiro Art Museum

The Chihiro Art Museum is considered the world's first art museum devoted to picture books. Established in 1977 to commemorate Chihiro Iwasaki (1918-1974), a Japanese picture book artist renowned for her works of children and flowers, it now has a collection of over 27,200 pieces created by 207 artists from 34 countries worldwide. There are two museums; one in Tokyo and one in Nagano (Azumino) which are run by the Chihiro Iwasaki Memorial Foundation.



Eriko Tanabe

Since 2012, Eriko has worked at the Chihiro Art Museum looking after public relations, the museum website, and editing the museum newsletter. She is in charge of workshops and events and has instructed local students to conduct watercolour workshops and museum tours. Eriko

has also managed Piezograph exhibitions in hospitals and institutions abroad in India, Korea, and Indonesia.



Michiko Matsukata

Since 2003, Michiko has worked at the Chihiro Art Museum as a curator and is also currently responsible for the library, PR, and international section. She has curated exhibitions such as the *Polish Picture Book Artists*, *Eun Young Cho*, *Run*, *Toto! The Making of a Picture Book*, and *Kota*

Taniuchi Exhibition: Follow the Wind. Besides reading, Michiko enjoys walking about.



Korea – Hyundai Museum of Kids' Books and Art

The Hyundai Museum of Kids' Books & Art (MOKA) is a cultural education space established in 2015 by Hyundai Department Store Group to contribute to the local community and support culture and arts. As the first museum in Korea to focus on picture books for children, the museum is designed to help children better understand who they are while they experience a wide range of educational programmes and exhibitions. MOKA presents the exhibition under various fields, such as picture books and contemporary art, as well as provide meaningful education programmes, such as the UNESCO ESD-certificated global citizenship education, art appreciation and creation programmes.



Noe Jeungmin

Noe Jeungmin is the director of the Hyundai Museum of Kids' Books & Art-MOKA. She received a Ph.D. at the University of Iowa, focusing on art education.



Singapore – Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators–Singapore Chapter

SCBWI is the preeminent membership organisation for children's book creators. It is a global community of writers, illustrators, translators, publishers, librarians, advocates and other industry professionals working to establish a more imaginative and inclusive world through the power of children's literature. Founded in 1971, SCBWI has more than 22,000 members worldwide.



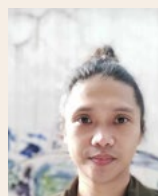
David Liew

David Liew, an illustrator of children's books, also crafts miniature worlds. Formerly a junior college teacher, he transitioned to professional illustration. His works include series like *Ellie Belly*, *The Plano Adventures*, and *Change Makers*. Liew instructs Picture Book illustration at the National Institute of Early Childhood Education and teaches art at Republic Polytechnic. He serves as Regional Advisor for the Singapore Chapter of the Society of Children's Books and Illustrators.



Philippines – Ang I.N.K. (Ilustrador ng Kabataan)

Ang Ilustrador ng Kabataan (Ang INK) is the Philippines' first and only organisation of illustrators committed to the creation and promotion of illustration for children. Founded in June 1991 as the offshoot of a Children's Book Illustration workshop sponsored by the PBBY (Philippine Board on Books for Young People) and the Goethe-Institut Manila, conducted by German illustrator Reinhard Michl, Ang INK's membership has grown from 21 workshop participants to more than 300 members.



Aldy Aguirre

Aldy C. Aguirre, an artist and illustrator in Quezon City, Philippines, has contributed to children's books for various publishers and independent writers. His work has been honoured by the Philippine Board on Books for Young People (PBBY) and the National Book Development Board, as well as internationally by ILUSTRARTE in Castelo Branco, among others. Aldy's illustrations for Papuntang Community Pantry were finalists in the 2022 Bologna Children's Book Fair Illustrators competition.



Thailand – Thai Section of International Board on Books for Young People (ThaiBBY)

ThaiBBY was first founded in 1979 by lecturers at Srinakharinwirot University under the name of "The Children's Reading Development Association" (CREDA). ThaiBBY's main mission is to support Thailand's presence in the international book market and sustain Thailand's participation in international organisations involved in children's book publishing. The current leadership of ThaiBBY intends to build upon its successful track record by seeking more opportunities to connect local stakeholders in the children's book industry with international exposure, resources, and assistance.



Peeriya Pongsarigun

Peeriya Pongsarigun is a translator, author, and publisher of children's books. She has co-translated more than 200 children's books, mostly from Thai to English, and co-founded InterThaiMedia LLC. Her dream is to bring Thai children's books out there for the world to see. She is currently Secretary-General of ThaiBBY.

The Asian Festival of Children's Content (AFCC) is the leading event of children's content which highlights Asia's rich culture and tradition by showcasing some of the best Asian writers, illustrators and content providers, promoting new materials that have been produced.
