Introduction

Cherry blossoms, autumn leaves. Mango, persimmon, apple trees. Helping to plant a seed, a sapling, waiting, and watching it grow. Listening to birds hidden in the branches. Laughing as we play hide and seek under the cool shade of a big tree as children, with our children, with our grandchildren. Crying when our kite is caught in a tree too high to reach. Hurt when trees are cut down without warning. Happy when we plant a seed, a sapling, and know that, together, we can grow a forest. Cherry blossoms, autumn leaves, growing up together with trees, at home with nature.

Forest of Stories is an annotated bibliography of children's picture books about trees that will capture your imagination, touch your hearts, and inspire your spirit. There are over 100 stories from Asia and around the world in this collection which we gathered into five themes: Tree of Dreams and Nourishment, Turning of the Seasons, Trees are Wild Things, Trees as Sanctuary, I Speak for the Trees. We hope this will be a useful resource for parents, teachers, creators of children's content, and everyone who loves books.

As Singapore celebrates 50 years as a nation, we would like to pay tribute to its founding father, the late Mr Lee Kuan Yew, for his vision and legacy in transforming Singapore into a 'City in the Garden' enjoyed by Singaporeans and visitors alike. Since the 1960s, a Parks and Recreation Department and now the National Parks Board have been the custodians of this vision.

On 16 June 1963, then Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew planted a mempat tree in the middle of Holland Circus to start a national effort to add beauty and reduce the harsh environment. That tree and roundabout had to be removed to make way for road projects. In 1971, Mr Lee planted a second tree, a yellow flame, in Tanjong Pagar to launch the annual tree planting day.

The yellow flame tree has grown from a sapling to 20 metres and remains in the community where Mr Lee had served for 60 years. The yellow flame and many much older trees in Singapore have stories to tell. You will find some memories retold in this collection, and we look forward to more in future.



Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew planting a *mempat* (*cratoxylum formosum*) tree at Holland Circus (junction of Holland Road, Farrer Road and Queensway) to mark the beginning of his tour of Ulu Pandan constituency. The ceremony also signified the beginning of an island-wide tree planting campaign.

Here is a glimpse into what you will discover as you stop to enjoy each of the stories that have been gathered under five themes, with the poetic and the profound beautifully expressed in words and illustrations. We hope children will share these stories with others, and share with us new stories about trees!

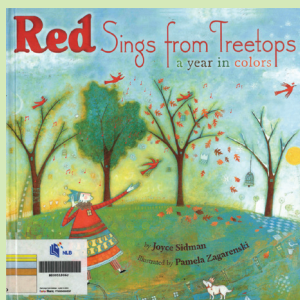

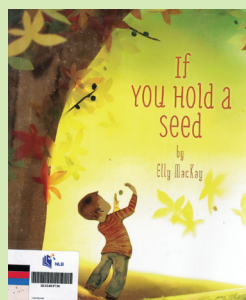


Turning of the Seasons

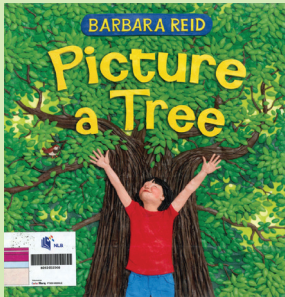

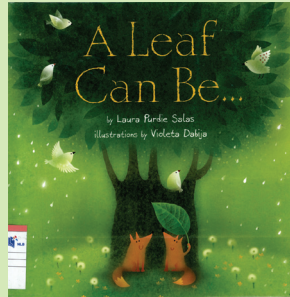


Trees are Wild Things

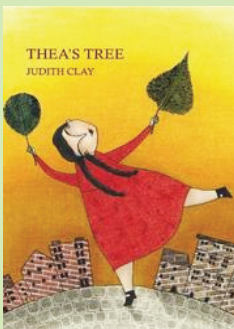

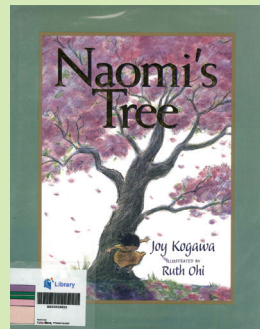


Trees as Sanctuary

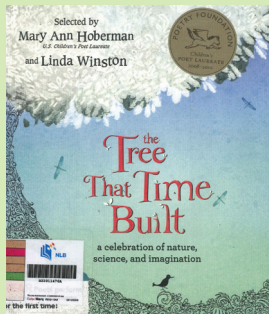

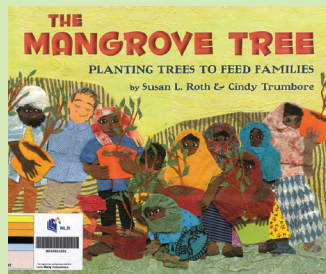


I Speak for the Trees

My Tree House World's **1**st Green Library for Kids

Central Public Library is home to My Tree House – World's 1st Green Library for Kids. This pioneering library is steered by green principles in all facets from design and infrastructure to collection and programming. Created in partnership with Asia's leading eco-developer City Developments Limited (CDL), this unique eco space facilitates environmental literacy in children. Opened on 31 May 2013 by Dr Yaacob Ibrahim, Minister for Communications and Information, My Tree House was awarded the top-tier Green Mark Platinum Award by the Building and Construction Authority of Singapore for its extensive use of environmentally-sustainable materials and energy-efficient fittings.

FEATURE HIGHLIGHTS

1. Tree House and Eco Attributes

Forming the centrepiece of the eco library, the striking tree house canopy features the creative use of over 3,000 recycled plastic bottles while the tree trunk is largely fabricated with aluminium, mild steel and plywood, which are recyclable, and fibre glass. Other green features in the library include the refurbished book shelves, carpet made with high amounts of recycled content and energy-efficient LED lighting.

2. The Knowledge Tree

This interactive installation is set in an enchanted forest where a magical tree grows and prompts questions on environmental awareness. Using shadow movement, one can uncover the questions and select answers to the quiz. The right answers will nourish the tree and delight the forest creatures; the wrong answers will make the tree wither – allowing its young users to understand how their actions can impact the environment.



3. The Weather Stump

The visual projection on the stump marks the temperature, wind speed and rainfall recorded at Marina Barrage over a 24-hour period, with an update every five minutes. The colour of the ring shows the temperature, the number in km/h on the white line indicates the wind speed and irregular outlines on the ring represent rainfall.

4. Green Collection and Programmes

30% of the 45,000 books in My Tree House are focused on green themes like nature, environment and conservation, while fiction books including fairytales, fantasy and folklores related to the theme of the enchanted forest make up the rest of the collection. There are also green themed eBooks and educational games available through interactive and child-friendly eReading kiosks. The library also hosts an array of eco craft programmes for young readers.
